

A Pictorial History of the Tri-City Model Railroaders



- 1964 Gene Miller and Gerry Ohler met and began modeling together.
- 1966 John DeSteese met Bill McDill. Bill was building an HO-scale dual gauge railroad.
- John and Bill organized the first 5th Division mini-meet in the Tri-Cities, February 17. This was the pivotal event in the history of the Tri-City Model Railroaders.



- The "Hunting Lost Spring" group was "organized" and met round robin at members' homes. Members included: John DeSteese, Taylor Graham, Bill McDill, Gene Miller, Bob Moore, Gerry Ohler, and Allan Schneider. George Goulet and Jim Taylor joined soon after.
- In a one month rush, the group built the first "club" layout in Gene's unfinished family room. This 6 x 10 foot layout was displayed at the newly opened Columbia Center Mall in February. Bob Moore published an article on this effort in the 1971 NMRA Bulletin.









Layouts at Smitty's Pancake House




1971 Group moved the Tri-City Railroad from Ohler's basement to the vacant room above Smitty's Pancake House in Pasco.

In addition, a new 5 x 16-foot portable layout was constructed. This layout was operated from handwritten orders by Bob Moore. Bob published an article, "80 minutes of operation in 80 square feet" in the Jan 1980 *Railroad Model Craftsman* describing these operations.

1973 First annual Open House held March 31 at the Pancake House was attended by 284 guests.

Four layouts were in operation; 20 x 40 foot club layout, 5 x 16 foot portable layout, two sceniced N-scale layouts.

Highlight was a 73-car freight train with 3 steam locos on the head and 2 more cut in the middle.

1975 The first card order operating system was introduced on April 4 on the combined portable and large layouts.

The Transition

- 1976 Lost lease at Smitty's
- 1977 By January of '77 the portable layout was sold, the main layout was dismantled, and we were back to round-robin meetings.
- 1977 Two 2 ½ x 8 foot modules were built to the Wenatchee Southern Model Railroaders specifications, but the effort was short lived.
- 1977 Began negotiations with Richland Parks Department on Friday, January 13th for the building net to Bateman Island. Renovation began in June.
























































